In Dundee, the long-term, £1bn Dundee Waterfront transformation project will bring a wealth of conference and incentive venues to the area, including hotels, galleries, green spaces and the V&A at Dundee, due to open in 2015. The museum will feature more than 1,500m² of flexible meeting and conference space.

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Wyndham Grand The

Angus, a new five-star 187room hotel five miles from Dundee, will also open in 2015, complete with spa and leisure facilities, an 18-hole golf course and conference and

banqueting suites.

Glasgow's Hydro Arena will open in September, designed for a wide range of conferences and events and boasting a seat capacity of 12,000; while in Aberdeen, the area around the airport will play host to the ABZ Business Park, a £100m investment project. The new development is intended to encourage more business tourism to the area due to its proximity to the airport. Plans have recently been announced to include two major hotel brands to its venue portfolio, the Ibis and the Novotel.

In addition to the venue's event spaces such as the Alistair Grant Gallery and the Orientation Area, which can be used for receptions, gala dinners and meetings, delegates can enjoy a range of outdoor or indoor teambuilding activities, all within the grounds of the farm. ■


